Make a... gift tag

Step 1

ONCE you've finished your stitching, trim your aida to fit your tag and fray the outer row of aida blocks all the way around. Back with white card.

Step 2

ATTACH your stitching to the tag using double-sided tape. Punch a hole at the top of the tag. Loop a piece of baker's twine through to finish.



How to... mount your work

Step 1



PEEL the backing paper away from the beginning of your tape and stick to your hoop, close to the top. Wind the tape around your hoop, peeling away a small section of backing paper at a time.

Step 2



TRIM your stitching and backing fabric into a circle slightly larger than your hoop. Place the inside hoop beneath your work and the outer hoop on top. Pull your fabric edges taut and tighten the screw.

Step 3



USING a glue gun or double-sided tape, attach the first layer of fabric, pulling taut as you go. Repeat for the second layer. Glue a circle of felt over the back of your hoop for a smooth finish.

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An interview with... Sarah Fordham

The designer behind Etsy's funkiest cross stitch jewellery discusses her crafting life and getting a book deal

Interview by **Jessica Bateman**

e've noticed a lot of stunning cross stitch jewellery popping up on Etsy and other online stores recently, but Sarah Fordham's designs still stand out as among the funkiest and most playful. As well as her Etsy shop, MaMagasin – which sells a colourful array of rings and badges adorned with fun, fresh motifs – she's just released her first book. We sat down for a chat about life as a self-employed designer-maker...

Tell us about your earliest crafting memory

I remember making lots of items for my Barbie dolls when I was little including a climbing frame made out of straws and Sellotape, which I was particularly proud of. I've always been self-taught, as I've never had the interest or patience to follow intricate



patterns. I get more enjoyment from muddling through on my own.

How did you learn to stitch, and what do you like about it?

I used to ask my mum to show me how to do various embroidery stitches,

but I was very young and I don't think I had a good attention span! I later studied Fine Art at university in Leeds and started leaning towards embroidery, in particular tapestry and cross stitch. I made quite large pieces at the time, which were a bit of a slog.

I find that creating smaller pieces is what makes my work more enjoyable these days, as there is no time for boredom to set in. I also love the fact I can do cross stitch anywhere and don't need any specialist equipment. It can be quite therapeutic, too.

What made you decide to start your own Etsy shop, and how have you found the experience?

I can't remember exactly how I discovered Etsy, but I'm so glad I did. I've had a shop there for a few years, but have only been making regular sales for the past year or so. Etsy has been a fantastic platform for getting

noticed by stockists and gaining publicity – even my book publisher found me on there! I think people spend so much time worrying about sales, but it can be a great way to just get some exposure.

Who or what inspires you?

I can be inspired by absolutely anything! A lot of my smaller motifs are fairly traditional – such as the Mexican Sugar Skulls or woodland critters like foxes and birds.

Recently, I've been making a lot of samplers, often featuring funny song lyrics or quotes from TV and film.

What is your studio like?


Well, it's queen-sized and very squishy. No really, I don't have a studio and tend to work from my bed or the settee! This is partly because I don't have the luxury of being able to afford a studio, but also because I don't think it's necessary for what I do. I only work with a messy sewing box and a heap of colourful aida canvas – none of this needs expensive studio space.

Can you describe a typical day in your life?

I have a day job working in a shop, so that can take up a lot of time. It's great though, as without it I would easily become the world's biggest hermit!

When I'm not there, I sit and beaver away on orders while ploughing through DVD box sets.

I'm also guilty of ogling Jake Gyllenhaal fan blogs and eating too many Kit Kat Chunkys.

When asked if I'd like to make a book, I jumped at the chance. Now I have a better understanding of how it works, I'm thinking up ideas for future books (if anyone would like to publish them!).

What's next for you?

Well, this is quite a busy time of year for my online shops, and I've also been hosting workshops at places such as The Knitting and Stitching Show and Liberty. Next year, I'm going to try to create more definitive 'collections' of work, and attend more craft fairs.



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


HOUSE WARMING

Cosy up with this colourful row of festive houses – will you stitch the ornaments, the mounted picture, or both?

HOUSE WARMING



Make an... ornament

Step 1

TRIM your stitching, leaving 2cm along each edge. Cut your backing fabric to the same size and lay on top of your stitching, right sides together.

Step 2

SEW around your shape leaving the bottom open. Turn right side out. Cut your card to the house shape, insert behind your stitching, and stuff.

Step 3

CUT your square of felt in half diagonally to form two triangles. Fold and cut one triangle in half again to form the base for your house.

Step 4

PRESS under the raw edges of the remaining opening. Pin to the bottom of your house, with the long edge to the front. Whip stitch along the edges.



OWL KEEP YOU WARM

Designed by: Maria Diaz Design size: 7x9cm Stitch time: 8 hours each

Make a... hand warmer

Step 1

DRAW your desired shape on the reverse of your stitching and cut out. Cut a second piece of felt to the same size and shape.

Step 2

BLANKET stitch around the edges of your pieces, leaving an opening in the bottom for filling.

Step 3

PUSH a small piece of stuffing into each ear at the top. Use a wooden skewer to push it into place.

Step 4


FILL your hand warmer with rice before finishing your stitching all the way around.


Materials

Hand warmers

- Natural felt, one 20x20cm piece for stitching, one 12x12cm piece for backing
- 14 count waste canvas, 15x15cm
- Stuffing
- Plain rice

HAND WARMERS

Once filled with rice, microwave your hand warmers for 30 seconds on medium heat. If they need more time, add 5-10 seconds at a time. Always check how hot they are before handing over to children.

Make a... cup cosy

Step 1

TRIM your stitching to 29x12cm. Place your backing fabric on top, right sides in, and sew around three sides. Turn right sides out. Press under the raw edges on remaining side and topstitch.

Step 2

PRESS your remaining fabric pieces in half, lengthwise, and sew along the edge. Turn right side out. Turn under the raw edges and topstitch to form your tabs.

Step 3

ATTACH the hooked side of the Velcro dots to the wrong side of the tabs. Sew a button to the right side. Position the other side of your Velcro on your cosy and stick on your tabs.

Step 4

WRAP the cosy around your mug, and pin the remaining end of the tab in place. Un-Velcro from the mug and topstitch the tab ends.



Our cosy is designed to fit a 28cm circumference mug, but you can easily adjust the tabs to fit your favourite

Materials

Cup cosy

- 28 count ivory evenweave, 40x20cm for stitching, two 10x5cm for tabs
- Natural backing fabric, 14x2.5cm
- Velcro dots
- Buttons, 15mm





Make a... banner

Step 1

TRIM your stitching to 38x45cm. Lay your backing fabric over your stitching and sew along the sides. Turn right sides out and press.

Step 2

FOLD the raw edges in at the top and bottom and topstitch. Fold down 6cm of fabric to the back of your banner at the top and bottom and pin in place.

Step 3

MEASURE 3cm from each edge and pin along the line. Sew along your line, removing the pins as you reach them. Add your dowels and tie your cord in place.


Keep stains at bay by spraying your napkins and placemats with a fabric protector, such as Scotchguard, before you use them

Materials

Banner

- 28 count white evenweave, 55x60cm
- White backing fabric, 38x45cm
- Wooden dowels, two with 10mm diameter
- White twisted cord, 1m






PLACEMATS

Mix and match the charts to make your own placemat design. Make sure to measure the plates you will be using to get the look you want. You can follow the basic instructions for napkins, using your own measurements, to finish things off. Just don't forget to add seam allowances!

SILVER SERVICE



FOR YOUR HOME

Make a... napkin

Step 1

TRIM your stitching to 59x33cm, with the stitching 10cm from the right and bottom edge. Place your backing fabric over your stitching, right sides together and sew, leaving an opening for turning.

Step 2

TURN your napkin right side out and press well. Topstitch 0.5cm and 1cm from the edges, all the way around. This will add a professional finish to your napkins.

Napkins

- 28 count white evenweave, 70x45cm each
- White backing fabric, 59x33cm each

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





Make a... stretched canvas frame

Step 1



STARTING with a basic frame, cut a piece of mount board to exactly the same size as the outside edge of the frame. Attach using double sided tape.

Step 2



PLACE double sided tape on the back of the frame. Mark and match up the centre points on the frame and fabric edges.

Step 3




STRETCH the fabric to the reverse, folding neatly at each corner. Staple the fabric to the back of the frame. Secure the raw edges with tape.

Step 1

DRAW your desired shape on the reverse of your stitching and trim, adding seam allowances. Cut your remaining fabrics to the same shape.

Step 2

TACK your ribbon loop in place, with the loop down over your stitching. Sandwich your stitching between two backing pieces.

Step 3

SEW around your shape, leaving an opening for turning. Turn your sachet right side out and fill with stuffing.

Step 4

WHIP stitch the remaining opening. Stitch around the sachet using blanket stitch and two strands of a coordinating thread.



Make an... envelope cushion

Step 1



TRIM your stitching to 31x31cm and back with a piece of fabric. Hem one 31cm edge on each backing piece. Right sides in, lay your first hemmed piece over your stitching.

Step 2



LAY your second hemmed piece on top, so the two pieces overlap each other in the centre. Pin along the hem to hold in place. Pin around the edges of your cushion.

Step 3



STITCH all the way around the outside edge of your cushion. Trim excess fabric at the corners. Turn your cushion right sides out. Press and pop on your cushion pad.

Hoops with style

Turn an embroidery hoop into a fun and original frame that will show off your stitching at its best

mbroidery hoops are a simple, affordable and effective way to display your stitching. But while a plain hoop can look understated, you can create a bigger impact and add to the finished piece by decorating the wood using paint, ribbon and even crochet. Here, designer and author Kirsty Neale shares six clever ways to transform a humble hoop into the funkiest of frames.





THE Savvy Stitcher

HOW TO... DECORATE YOUR HOOPS

Yarn wrapped hoops

WRAP double-sided tape around a small section of the hoop and peel off the backing paper. Press the end of your yarn onto the tape and wrap it tightly around the frame, keeping the strands as close together as possible. When you've covered all the tape, add more and carry on wrapping the yarn. To change colours, snip off the end of the current yarn and press the end of the new shade down next to it.



Collaged hoops

SPREAD glue over a section of your hoop. Tear paper into small strips, then press the first one down on the hoop and spread more glue on top. Add a second piece next to the first, overlapping the edges. Keep going until the whole frame is covered. This technique works best with thin or soft papers, such as tissue or newspaper. Pick colours and patterns to work with the design inside your hoop.



Crocheted hoops

VISIT www.simplycrochetmag.co.uk for a guide to crochet if you're new to the craft. Old hands start here: sew backstitches around the fabric edge. Work two double crochets through each stitch. To form the scalloped trim, chain one, then *skip one foundation stitch. Work five treble crochets into the next stitch. Skip one foundation stitch, then work a double crochet into the next one.* Repeat from * to * all the way around.



Painted hoops

BRUSH two or three thin coats of paint over the outside edges of your hoop, leaving each one to dry before adding the next. Using a fine brush or paint pen, add (optional) patterns, such as spots or stripes, in a contrasting colour. For a glossy finish, spray or brush on a coat of clear varnish to seal and protect your finished paint job. To create a stained effect, brush on a single coat of watered-down paint.



Decorative taped hoops

PRESS your tape down over the outer edge of the hoop, then smooth it around the edges. For narrower tapes, try wrapping a few different patterns around the frame to create stripes, or layer two strips horizontally. When you reach the top of the hoop, trim the tape to fit around the metal hardware. You could make your own tape by pressing double-sided tape onto tissue paper or thin fabric.



Braided hoops

START with your fabric stretched into a hoop. Glue ribbon or fancy braid around the outer edge of the hoop. Velvet ribbon is especially effective, as it has a deeper profile than satin or grosgrain and adds a flash of colour when seen straight on. You can stick pom-pom trim around the curve of the hoop, where the fabric meets the wooden edge, while gathered lace trims are a great alternative to crochet.

TOP TIPS FROM DESIGNER...

Once you've completed your hoop, consider how you can display it to get maximum impact. Here are a few of my ideas you could try...

Hang it up

The obvious way to hang an embroidery hoop is from a hook or nail in the wall – resting either the screw or the inner edge of the hoop over the hook. Create a bold display by hanging several hoops together, gallery style.

Take a stand

You could use a plate stand to support small or medium-sized hoops on a flat surface, like a shelf or side table. Look out for simple, modern stands, rather than traditional, ornate versions, so they don't draw attention away from the design.

In suspension

Tie a length of strong, clear thread to the top of your hoop and fix the other end to a hook or drawing pin, so you can suspend it almost invisibly from the ceiling. This is really effective if you stick two hoops together, back-to-back, creating a double-sided design.

On the shelf

For an easy, relaxed look, prop up your finished hoop on a bookshelf. It should rest comfortably against the books, but if it needs some extra help staying put, place a small piece of Blu-Tac out of sight on the back edge at the bottom of the hoop.

Doors and drawers

Door or drawer knobs make a great alternative to wall hooks, although they're of course too bulky to fit behind a hoop. Instead, thread a length of ribbon through the screw-fixing in the hoop, knot the ends, then slip it over the knob.

Hoops on hooks

Try something similar with a peg rail or row of coat hooks to display several hoops together. Cut each piece of ribbon or string to a different length, so the hoops are at staggered heights when you hang them up. For added fanciness, tie the ribbon or string ends in a neat bow.

Scrabble around

Create a hoop-friendly mini-shelf by fixing a wooden Scrabble-tile holder to the wall. (Buy spares online if you don't want to raid your own game.) You can either screw it into place or, if your hoop is fairly light, stick the holder up with strong, double-sided tape.

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
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
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TOOLS OF THE TRADE

NEEDLES

For basic stitching you'll need a tapestry needle that has a blunt tip and large eye. Use a size 24 needle for most aidas, and a size 26 for evenweaves and linens. Use a sharp embroidery needle for finer details such as backstitch and French knots.

EMBROIDERY SCISSORS

Embroidery scissors are an absolute must-have for stitchers and can be picked up for just a few pounds. Keep yours sharp by only using them to cut threads – that way a decent pair should last you a lifetime.

STRANDED COTTON

Embroidery thread is also commonly referred to as stranded cotton. Each thread length is made up of six strands of cotton twisted together. The chart key will indicate how many strands you'll need to stitch your design with.

HOOPS AND FRAMES

Though not absolutely essential, we do recommend using an embroidery hoop or frame to keep an even stitching tension. Just make sure it's big enough to fit your entire design.

AIDA

Aida is an ideal choice for cross stitch beginners.


14 count is the most common, although it's available in a huge variety of colours and counts. Each cross stitch is worked over a single aida block, making counting and keeping your place a cinch.

EVENWEAVE

Evenweave is much simpler to work with than you might think. Start with a 25 or 28 count evenweave, such as Zweigart Lugana. Once you're confident, try your hand at a linen version.

THE CHART

START stitching from the centre of the design and your fabric. The centre of our charts are indicated by dotted lines. To find the centre of your fabric, fold it in half and then into quarters.



Reading the chart

EACH square on the chart represents a single cross stitch. Fractionals are half filled squares or squares filled with two different colours.

THE KEY

appear on the chart appear on the chart are listed in the key with their corresponding thread codes beside them. The key also tells you the different stitches used in the design.

Colour match

IN THE key, the closest column of thread codes listed next to the chart symbols is the thread brand that's used in the dec

brand that's used in the design. Similar colour matches are listed alongside it.

Start stitching... on aida

Step 1



CUT a 40cm thread length, and thread your needle with two of the six strands. Knot one end and start with a waste knot (opposite). Make a diagonal half cross stitch across a single aida block.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross. Alternatively, you can work a row of half cross stitches first, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.


Step 3



THE direction of your diagonals is up to you, just be sure all your stitches cross in the same direction. Otherwise, your design will look uneven. Continue working from the centre outward.


Start stitching... on evenweave

Step 1



INSTEAD of taking your needle diagonally across a single aida block, take your needle diagonally across two evenweave threads, creating a half cross stitch as before.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross stitch. Work each stitch individually or work a row of half cross stitches, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.

Step 3




CONTINUE working from the centre of your design outward. If you find the extra counting a bit daunting at first, don't give up. We promise it'll become second nature in no time.

BACKSTITCH

Use this easy stitch to give a neat outline and add details

Step 1



WORK your backstitch using a sharp needle, once you've finished the cross stitch. To secure your thread, weave it through the back of your stitches, then bring your needle up to the surface.

Step 2



WORK your backstitch over about 1-3 chart squares at a time, making sure to closely follow the chart. Any longer and your stitches could end up becoming loose and pulling out.

Step 3



FOR each additional stitch, bring your needle up 1-3 chart squares away from your previous stitch. Then pass it back through the fabric at the same point as your previous stitch.

WASTE KNOT

A simple way to get started stitching

Step 1



KNOT one end of your thread and take it down through the front of your fabric, about 2cm from your starting point. Then bring it back up to the front of your fabric to make your first stitch.

Step 2



BEGIN stitching your design, making sure you're stitching over your starting thread with each stitch. You can work whole stitches or work half stitches then come back on yourself.

Step 3



ONCE you're happy that your starting thread is secure, snip off the knot. To secure your thread when you've finished stitching, weave it through the back of your stitches as shown here.

LOOP KNOT


This easy start to your cross stitch is brilliantly neat

Step 1




IF YOU'RE working in two strands, a loop knot is the easiest and neatest method. Cut a single length of thread, twice as long as normal. Fold it in half to create a loop at one end.

Step 2



THREAD your needle with the two tail ends, just as you normally would. Bring your needle up to the front of your fabric, leaving a small loop of thread on the reverse.

Step 3




MAKE a half cross stitch, passing your needle through the loop on the reverse as shown here. Pull all the way to secure the thread. Now continue with your stitching as normal.

FRENCH KNOTS

Go dotty with this simple way to add neat knots to your designs

Step 1



USE a sharp embroidery needle to help pierce the fabric. Bring your needle up at your starting point and wrap your thread once or twice around the needle. Use one strand for a small knot and two for a slightly chunkier knot.

Step 2



HOLD your thread end firmly and take your needle down, ever so slightly over from where you came up. Slide the twisted thread down the needle, so it rests on the fabric's surface, and gently feed the needle through the fabric.

Step 3



KEEP your thread as taut as possible to prevent the knot becoming loose. Gently pull your thread through to tighten the knot, so that it sits neatly on the surface. And remember, if you don't get it right away, keep practising!

FRACTIONALS

These little stitches are great for adding a bit more detail to your work

Step 1



START with a quarter stitch, working from one corner into the centre. For evenweave, there is already a hole in the centre to stitch into. With aida, you'll need to pierce the centre of the block.

Step 2



MAKE your next quarter stitch in your second colour, coming up from the opposite corner and back down through the centre. You've now created a half cross stitch.

Step 3



FINISH your stitch by making a half cross stitch. Fractionals are shown in the chart either as two symbols opposite one another in a chart square, or by a symbol opposite an empty space.

BEADING

TO ATTACH beads, you'll need a thin, flexible beading needle. Thread with one strand of cotton. Bring your needle to the front of your design, thread on a bead and make a diagonal stitch to secure the bead. If you like, stitch through again for added security.




HALF CROSS STITCH

HALF cross stitches are exactly what they sound like - half of a cross stitch. Each diagonal stitch is worked across two evenweave threads or one aida block. They're most often used to create a subtle background in a design.



WASTE AND SOLUBLE CANVAS

WASTE and soluble canvases are used when stitching on plain fabrics and felts. Tack onto your fabric and stitch as normal. Soluble canvas dissolves in water. For waste canvas, soak in water then remove each thread individually.

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
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
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
